New Joint Task Force will create joint Army/Air element



CONCORD-The Adjutant General stood up a permanent Army/Air Joint Task Force on Jan. 15 under the command of Brig. Gen. Ken Clark to insure that the New Hampshire National Guard presents a consolidated response to any request from the Governor.

"The tragedy that occurred on September 11, 2001 caused everyone to reflect on our nation's readiness to defend the homeland," Maj. Gen. John E. Blair said in a December 31 memorandum to all Army and Air National Guard staff and commanders. "It brought the need for jointness in our state into even clearer focus."

While responding jointly is not a new concept, establishing a Joint Task Force formalizes the process of Military Assistance

Challenges for the new year

During the January UTA many of us attended a joint (Army and Air) NH National Guard workshop on family readiness. Briefly, much of the workshop dealt with educating our civilian and military Family Readiness Program points of contact about the programs available to unit members and their families. Do you know who your military Family Program contact is? If not, getting that information should be part of your readiness preparation. These unit members are the "link" between the resources the Wing has to offer and the families of deployed members. Your military POC works with the civilian volunteer to ensure that family readiness support is available to the members of your squadron/flight.

At the Wing and State levels we are fortunate to have some wonderful folks running the Family Readiness Program. 2nd Lt. Ken Leedberg (Air) has recently replaced Lt. Trina Wycoff as the State Family Program Coordinator. Here at the Wing, we have two individuals running

our Family Readiness Program: Mrs. Bonnie Rice and Capt. Bill Wilson (in his community manager role.) These three have already made an impact by doing a great job preparing our recent deployers and their families. At the same time they have been managing the reception program for our returning folks.

While it's great to have such a dynamic team working here full-time, I need to ask for your support. Please ensure that your family members have this team's contact information and encourage them not to be hesitant to call these numbers. We take great pride in helping our fellow member's families if and when needed. Also make sure your family has your Social Security number available - this is critical if agencies such as the Red Cross need to contact you for any reason. Take the time to explain, as best you can, your pay and entitlements; leave your family our finance number so they can call if they have questions. Another critical topic to cover with your family is changes in your health care coverage due to deployment.

The good news is that even if your family forgets all that you have prepared them for, they can call our Family Readiness team and work through any issues that arise.

to Civil Authorities (MACA). Planning such a response used to be an all-Army job with informal Air help. Now Air Guard personnel, where appropriate, will be dual-tasked to support JTF initiatives. When crisis occurs, the Joint Task Force, experienced and trained in joint operations, will be in place to ensure rapid and effective response.

"There are some areas where there is just so much cross over, it just makes sense to have them working together in a common office" says Brig. Gen. Clark. While Air people will still be assigned to their existing positions in the

Headquarters and Wing, there are going to be times when they drill together with Army counterparts. The JTF will be a formal organization."

"The key to making this work right now is interoperability and common training," Clark says. To start the process, JTF planners will conduct a tabletop exercise on Feb. 18 as a step toward the major September MACA exercise. That exercise will challenge the JTF, as well as the units of both the Army and Air Guard, with a test of command and control, communications as well as providing valuable training.

In a related development, the Department of Defense stood up Northern Command (NORTHCOM) Oct. 1. Its job is to work issues that include the missions and rules of engagement for the use of Active, Guard, and Reserve forces in the war on terrorism and homeland defense. The JTF will also be responsible for working with NORTHCOM to determine exactly how the NHNG will support DOD missions within the United States.

"One of the best features of the new building is a dedicated training room," she continued, "and training is our number one priority."

Alterations Program Change

After further clarification it has been determined that AFI 65-601 and AFM 23-110 are more restrictive than previously thought. Therefore, the following change has been implemented. Clothing & Issue will no longer be able to fund the sewing of accoutrements for promotion only. The funding for sewing of stripes and accoutrements on initial and replacement issue clothing will continue as normal. As a reminder, replacement issue will be based on fair wear and tear.

Good Information to know:

Organizational & Cold Weather items are purchased by your squadron. This is accomplished by having an AUTHORIZATION FOR INDIVIDUAL EQUIPMENT FORM (FL#1) signed by your squadron's resource advisor approving the purchase. Please remember, high demands could result in your items being back-ordered. Don't wait until the last minute, plan ahead whenever possible!

To better serve you, DESERT UNIFORMS are now located at Clothing Issue! If you are TASKED to an SWA

location, please call us immediately to schedule a fitting! All "bag" items are still being issued out of Mobility, located in Bldg. 252.

MAGNUM HITEC AND WINTER WOLVERINE BOOTS will no longer be purchased. Why? The boot is no longer made by an approved source. We will continue issuing these boots from stock until depleted and then we will begin offering new boots from Belleville. We apologize for the inconvenience.

New Air Force Nametags

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. John P. Jumper and other senior leaders selected a new nametag for the uniform at the 2002 Corona Top conference in Colorado Springs, Colo.

The new service dress nametag has a brushed satin finish and blue letters. It is slightly larger and heavier than the blue plastic nametag worn on the blue shirt and medical white uniform. It will only feature the wearer's last name and will only be worn on the service dress, on the right side parallel to the ribbons and medals. Air Force officials decided last year that a nametag was needed on the service dress

uniform. Several proposals were reviewed and feedback was gathered from across the Air Force during several wear-tests.

The new nametag is available in Army and Air Force Exchange Service military clothing sales stores. The most current information states, that each individual is responsible for the purchase of their own nametag. You can order yours at www.aafes.com!

What is a Power of Attorney?

A power of attorney designates another person to act as your agent or "attorney in fact" when you are deployed, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to be present. A POA can be an extremely useful tool in the event you are unable to make certain decisions or sign important documents because you are on an extended TDY or leave. Events could transpire during your absence requiring your signature or input; if you have designated an agent by way of a POA, your agent can act on your behalf.

Types of Powers of Attorney

There are two basic types of POA: general and special. A general POA grants the agent broad powers and should terminate on a specified date. A special POA only gives the agent the power to complete a certain transaction.

General Power of Attorney

A general POA can be dangerous because it permits your agent to do anything you could legally do: enter into a contract, buy a car, withdraw funds, or take out a loan - all in your name. Be sure you trust the designated agent. General powers of attorney should be used when you will be gone on a long deployment, or gone for a long enough period of time that you cannot anticipate all likely transactions you might have to complete.

The paralegal assisting you will ask you to set a length of time or condition after which the POA will terminate. For instance, in estate planning, we will give you a power of attorney that will take effect only in the event of your incapacity to make decisions for yourself. For a more general POA, we will ask you to set a specific date.

Please note that Accounting and Finance will not accept a general power of attorney. You will need to get a special power of attorney in addition to the general power to conduct transactions relating to your military pay. Further, they will only allow your agent to conduct certain limited transactions. Please consult with us and Finance before relying upon a POA for your military pay transactions.

Special Power of Attorney

Many individuals, including most single people, may be better off granting a special POA. There is less risk because the agent only has the power to do the specific acts laid out in the POA instrument. With a special POA, you can have your agent take care of just your car, or house, cash your paycheck, or authorize medical care for your children; they will not be able to do anything that is not specified in the POA. Special POAs are a good choice for short deployments where you can easily anticipate the decisions that need to be made while you are away.

The IRS requires a special IRS POA to allow someone to file your taxes in your absence. The IRS POA does not need to be notarized, and may be downloaded from their website at <http://www.irs.ustreas.gov/>.

A durable power of attorney for healthcare gives your agent the ability to make decisions regarding your medical care in the event you become incapacitated. While this can provide a degree of security that you will not "linger on" without hope of recovery, your agent will literally have the power to decide whether you live or die. Only give a healthcare power of attorney to someone you trust completely and who you know can handle the stress of making the decision.

POAs are valuable tools. They can help you during deployments and other difficult circumstances. Just choose your agent carefully.

REMEMBER, if you or your military dependent needs a Will or Power of Attorney ("POA"), the legal office can draft those documents for you. Please stop by the office to discuss whether or not you need a Will/POA. The 157th ARW Legal office is located in Building 145 Room 211. Our office is staffed by Traditional Guardsmen only so an appointment is preferred, but by no means necessary. We may be reached at extension 2758 if you have any questions or concerns.
