August pause for reflection

I've just finished up a week of vacation, which turned out to be time for me to reflect upon what we have done since September 11, 2001, where we are going and what it means to me to be a member of this Wing. For our accomplishments since 9/11, I have often chronicled those accomplishments in this column and they are truly most impressive and should not be viewed lightly. Our deployment activity, coupled with our home station transition to 24 hour, seven day a week operations are events that we have never attempted to that degree before. It is something every member of

this Wing should be proud of!

At this time (month of August) we are in our month of "reconstitution" - a month dedicated to get our training levels back up and replenishing and equipment or supplies that were utilized in the preceding months. In September our mobilized troops will be able to take their leave and finish up their demobilization activities, as the bulk of the Wing will be demobilized by the end of September. Starting October 1, we go back to work for Air Mobility Command. We will operate the base 24/7 but at reduced level from what we did previously this year. We will be providing a set number of sorties to support the air-refueling requirement for operational missions in the Northeast along with the Wings at Bangor, Pittsburgh and Niagara Falls. As you can imagine, there is a great deal of airlift going from/to the States and overseas locations. We expect this operational need for us to provide air-refueling support to continue for quite a while - and are planning till at least February 2004, for right now. We will be doing this mission in a "volunteer" status - not mobilized - so along with this mission we still need to prepare and execute things like: Aircrew Standardization Evaluation visit, where aircrews will be tested and given flight evaluations in Nov/Dec. We still need to fill our AEF and ECS taskings. We still need to get ready for our major Unit Compliance Inspection (UCI) next June. We still need to finish up our Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) requirements for this cycle and receive a final grade.

For our past accomplishments I take great pride and thank you for making them happen. For our future requirements I know we will take care of them in our typical manner. Being a member of this Wing, though, is what caused me the greatest reflection...

Recently one of our members- Major Jim Pettigrew (LGS) and family were facing a terrible crisis. Their daughter Jillian was seriously ill and most sadly has passed away. I know that many of you have and will support the family in this time of need. Prior to Jillian's passing, the members of this Wing took it upon themselves to sponsor a bone marrow drive - both here and at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. The turn out and dedication to this event was tremendous! More than 225 folks participated just at this base alone! When I think about the basic goodness of our folks for doing this coupled with the other wonderful events we do such as our Make A Wish visits, the Day of Caring, our Holiday Operation Sharing drive, etc; it really makes me feel like I belong to something that is much greater than myself. It is with great pride that I don my uniform each day and "become" a member of the 157th Air Refueling Wing - I thank you for that feeling.




Will the increase in deployment activity affect your outlook on re-enlistment? Why or why not?

"No, the increase in deployment activity hasn't affected my outlook on re-enlistment. The benefits of the Guard outweigh all of the work we do here at the unit."




SSgt. Noyes (Ground Radar Tech):

Computer training gets an upgrade

People have been asking the Communications flight what the relationship is between Information Assurance Awareness, SATE, and Network User Licensing.

The original IA program was known as Security Awareness Training and Education (SATE). This program directed training actions to ensure a basic level of security understanding with respect to networks and computer resources in general. One of the SATE tools was a computer based training package that concentrated on principles of what we'd called information assurance today.

Several years ago, the AF changed directions and began to transform the SATE program into the Information Assurance Awareness Program (IAAP). The associated computer based training (CBT) package became a "one-time" training requirement for access to DoD networks. Unit personnel already assigned had to complete the training at their units. New members received initial training from AETC during basic military training or technical schools. As some may recall, the ANG met this one-time requirement through a power-point based brief and test. The SATE program officially became the IAAP once this initial training was completed.

This initial, transitional training requirement then became part of network licensing and certification required in AFI 33-115V2. The CBT originally meant to be a "one-time" training aid became a web-based training package and typically an annual requirement for active duty personnel. This is not generally a requirement for the ANG as AFI 33-115V2 is

considered "not-applicable" to ANG personnel. However, personnel in duty positions directly supporting active duty organizations may still be required to complete the CBT. You can take this CBT and others by going to:

The only continuing related requirement for training for ANG personnel is exposure to Information Assurance principles through the IA Awareness

Program. The program is managed by MSgt. Wayne Dyer and SSgt. Adam Hughes. In the future training will be provided through articles in the Refueler, CCTV and briefings.

Rambling With the Retirees

There's a lot to share with you this month, so rather than waiting on the rain to go away and summer to return, I'll get right down to business. The June homecoming picnic was well attended as usual and had many faces we hadn't seen for awhile. It also prompted many questions and answers about retiree issues.

E-MAIL: After cleaning out my own email inbox, I can strongly say that the best and quickest way to stay informed about our association and important retiree issues is to be connected to the internet and use your email! Doug Murphy does an absolute terrific job in making sure that anything of retiree interest gets forwarded to our entire membership via email. However, you must make sure that you are updating your email address with him. If you're not receiving at least one email every 1-2 weeks from Doug, you probably need to drop him an email at Murph-D@comcast.net (Douglas W. Murphy, 235 Rosedale Ave, Manchester, NH 03103-6440, 603/625-8803).

REFUELER & ADDRESS CHANGES: When you change your mailing/residence address, there are two things you must do (some folks are still confused here). In order to receive the Refueler (and on occasion other written materials from the Wing), your mailing address must be added or updated in the retiree database that the Wing maintains for us. For a number of years now, Bobby Conant has helped to make this happen, and we thank him for his long-time efforts. Please note that it has become necessary to change our point of contact to SrA Cathy A. Coletti. Call Cathy for more information DSN:852-2477 (COM:603/430-2477) or via email at cathy.coletti@nhpeas.ang.af.mil.

Cathy shares this special note: "My personal concern is that Retirees also change their address with the DEERS folks for their ID/medical purposes. They can change online (www.tricare.osd.mil/deers) or at any ID Card Issuing Facility or The Military/Unit Personnel Office with the DEERS capability. We (MPF Pease) can give them guidance on that information for the

base nearest them. AND update Sierra at 1-888-999-5195. For eligibility problems call DEERS at 1-800-538-9552. Remember, that upon your 65th birthday, you'll be eligible for Medicare and have the option of changing your ID card. This information is on the back of your card - right mid section. There is an expiration date showing your medical eligibility (this is NOT your military date). Your card needs to reflect the new status."

ONLINE PERSONNEL RECORD REQUESTS: Military veterans and the next of kin of deceased former military members may now request copies of military personnel records online from the National Personnel Records Center. The new Web-based application was designed to provide better service on these requests by eliminating records mailroom processing time. Also, because the requester will be asked to supply all information essential for NPRC to process the request, delays that normally occur when NPRC has to ask veterans for additional information will be minimized. Veterans and next of kin (a surviving spouse that has not remarried, father, mother, son, daughter, sister, or brother) may access the application at <http://vetrecs.archives.gov>. (There is no requirement to type "www" in front of the web address.) Individuals, other than veterans or next of kin, with a need for documents must still complete the Standard Form 180 which can be downloaded from the site.

RETIREE MEETINGS: Sometimes real faces are needed to discuss information, and we hope members will continue attending. Our next meeting will be on Saturday, September 13 from 0900-1100 hrs in bldg 259. We will have a representative from Sierra to discuss/provide an update on Tricare For Life. Hope to see you then.
